Cresswell Crags was of particular interest to me as in early March Pat and I spent five days in northern Spain visiting Altimira and other cave sites across Cantabria, staying at a very nice hotel on the sea front at Santander. By the middle of the week the shadow of coronavirus was looming and on our final cave visit on Thursday afternoon we were the penultimate group to enter the cave before they were all closed at the beginning of the Spanish lockdown of all public facilities.

Friday afternoon we got back to Bilbao and after checking in at the hotel a group of use went straight to the Guggenheim Museum (what an amazing building) to make an early evening visit, when it was nearly empty, just in case it got closed down (although as it turned out it was still open on the Saturday as it is not publically owned). Saturday afternoon we arrived at the airport, which was also very quiet as many of the flights had been cancelled, and were much relieved to get our BA flight back to London. This looks like being our last adventure for some time, and so sad to see such a high death toll in Spain, despite the fact that they put an effective lockdown in place far more rapidly than we have in the UK.
