RECENT EVENTS

At the time of writing, two of the summer programme of Field Trips have taken place; the third, a visit to the excavations at Piddington Roman villa and to Horton is due

on September 17th.

The visit to Kirby Hall in July was attended by some 25-30 members. Dr Nicola Smith of English Heritage provided an illuminating introduction followed by a tour of the Hall. Brian Dix then guided members around the current series of excavations and explained how these are helping unravel the origins and later evolution of the formal gardens. The more energetic members of the party were then taken 'cross country' to see the earthwork remains of the deserted medieval village of Kirby before returning via the site of the Hall's wilderness garden.

In August Alan Hannan led a dozen or so members around ancient Brixworth church, outlining the Monastic origins, the building and rebuilding which have taken place,

and identifying the visible evidence.

The Society is very fortunate to benefit from the time and trouble taken by Nicola, Brian and Alan on these occasions and our thanks are due to each of them.

Northampton Central Museum's new archaeology gallery has recently been commended in the 1988 National Heritage Museum of the Year Awards.

COUNTY UNIT

The County Council Archaeology Unit has recently established two new posts aimed at enhancing its service to the County's archaeology. Graham Cadman has been appointed Field Officer at a time of heightened housing, quarrying and road construction pressures whilst the Countryside Commission are supporting the appointment of a Heritage Interpretation Officer in a move to promote awareness, enjoyment and acce to Northamptonshires rich past.

ARCHAEOLOGY CLASSES

Last September the Society organised a Day School with Liz MacRobert and Terry Pearson intended as an introduction to Roman and post-Roman pottery. Now the University of Leicester has arranged for Terry to give two Saturday classes on Saxon and Medieval pottery in Northamptonshire on the 3rd and 10th of December. The cost will be £8.50. These classes are only two of many being organised by the University Centre during the coming season. On Mondays there are classes in the afternoon, with Steven Young, on Practical Archaeology. Then in the early evening, Tony Brown on Roman Britain. Later at 8pm, in October Ancient Technology, Ann Woods and David Parsons; in January, Archaeological Materials, with Graham Morgan; and in March, Public Archaeology with Alan Hannan. On Wednesdays David Parsons returns accompanied by John Anstey, to deal with English Medieval Monasteries. Thursday sees Nicholas James with The New World Before Columbus. Other Saturday Schools will be covering Dowsing and Churh Archaeology, The Countryside in Roman Britain, amd Health and Medicine in Roman Britain.

There are classes in Brigstock, Brixworth, Long Buckby and Rothwell: several at Knuston Hall: and a whole seven days in Cambrdge if you can afford £189. Details of all these can be obtained from the University Centre, Barrack Road, Northampton.
