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# A BUMPER EDITION!

You will notice that your November NASNEWS arrives with a larger than usual number of enclosures. #### VILLAS GALORE!

These are halcyon days for the study of the Roman villa in Northamptonshire. Excavations took place on at least four villa sites over the summer and society members were treated to exclusive guided tours of two of them. On August 11th David Neal conducted us around his extensive excavations for the Central Excavation Unit at Stanwick. Of particular interest was a circular foundation of pitched stone interpreted by David as a donkey mill. We were also allowed a brief glimpse of the sculptured stones including the head of a figure being trampled by horse's hoofs which had recently featured in the national press. Those who attended this tour were invited to a further tour in the following week of the Oxfordshire Archaeology Unit's excavations ahead of gravel extraction near Redwell Farm, Stanwick. This site, less than a mile from the Stanwick villa is interpreted as having begun life as a mill but was turned into a villa around AD300. The exciting thing about this site, is that one of the walls of the villa collapsed or was deliberately pushed over into the surrounding sand and has been perfectly preserved. ARC the gravel company have now agreed to leave the villa intact. It is to be hoped that arrangements can be made to display it for the preservation of a complete wall is virtually unique in this country.

Meanwhile the Upper Nene Archaeological Society has been continuing its long running excavations at Piddington. One room is producing a fine hypocaust system while two adjacent and well-preserved windows were uncovered in the cellar which was discovered last year. In addition Steve Young has carried out a further season of excavations at Nether Heyford Roman villa. Most of the walls which were revealed had been robbed out but a small area of mosaic was discovered.

Thirty years ago Northamptonshire was regarded as something of a backwater in the Roman period. Recent work shows that this is far from the truth.

# JOURNAL 22

The next volume of Northamptonshire Archaeology is at last at the printers and it is hoped that it will be ready for distribution before Christmas. It caters for all tastes for it contains reports on Dennis Jackson's recent excavation of an Iron Age defended enclosure at Wootton Hill Farm near Hunsbury hillfort; the long awaited publications of the Roman villa at Weldon and the Anglo-Saxon cemetery at Wakerley excavated in the 1950s and 1960s respectively and a description of the medieval bridge at Ditchford.
