ALAN HANNAN

It is with deep regret that we announce the sudden death, on August 26th at the age of 60, of Alan Hannan. Alan was the County Archaeologist for Northamptonshire from 1976 to his retirement in 1995 as well as a long term NAS member and former Council participant. Building on a tradition of archaeological fieldwork established by a range of individuals in the county, Alan Hannan's major professional legacy is that of the county's modern archaeological service, established during a period of unprecedented change in British archaeology.

An Australian by birth, Alan took a degree in archaeology at Birmingham. He conducted major excavations in Tewksbury before the move to Northamptonshire. His deep love of the English landscape and its past will be familiar to those who attended his adult education courses. This passion and his energy and commitment extended beyond archaeology to his family and to a wide range of other interests. Whatever he was engaged upon, the abiding memory is of a man who inspired real affection and respect. Our deepest sympathies go to his wife Audrey and children Duncan and Camilla.
