County Council Heritage Services Update

As part of its budget proposals for 2003-04 Northamptonshire County Council has been, as reported in the January issue of NASNEWS, proposing to axe up to two thirds of its Historic Environment Team, formerly known as Northamptonshire Heritage. After some vigorous local and national lobbying it is understood that the County Council has partly relented and reduced the severity of their 'disinvestment' proposals. Whilst up to a third of posts will still be lost as part of a restructuring of the service it is pleasing to report that a new head of the Historic Environment Team has been appointed. This post effectively takes over from the 'old' County Archaeological Officer and will be occupied by Myk Flitcroft, formerly the County Council's archaeological planning officer. At a time when proposals abound for substantial new housing and commercial development, Northamptonshire's archaeology, historic landscapes and buildings have never been more vulnerable. NAS wish Myk good luck in what will doubtless be a challenging role. It is understood that an ongoing internal review will shortly decide the fate of other remaining posts. We hope to bring further details of services that will be available and the staff providing them in a future NASNEWS.
