

Between 1752 and 1832 the bodies of executed murderers were legally denied burial in consecrated ground. Instead they were donated for anatomical dissection or 'hung in chains' (displayed in a gibbet). A new major research programme funded by the Wellcome Trust is bringing Leicester academics in the School of Archaeology and Ancient History, and the School of Historical Studies together with colleagues from the University of Hertfordshire and Oxford Brookes University to examine the fate of the corpses of executed criminals.



John Williams was head of the Archaeological Unit of the Northampton Development Corporation in the 1970s to mid-1980s. He led excavations at St Peter's Street and the 'Palaces' site, which demonstrated that the origins of the town lay in the middle Saxon period. The results of his recent documentary research, 'Town and Crown: The Governance of Later Thirteenth Century Northampton', will shortly be published by the Northamptonshire Record Society.
