




David Neal is a leading figure in the archaeology of Roman Britain. He has excavated widely, including Stanwick Roman villa in Northamptonshire, and is a regular and characteristically enthusiastic guest with *Time Team*. He is perhaps most renowned for his monumental research and co-authorship with Stephen Cosh of the corpus of Romano-British mosaics. A highlight of these volumes, now approaching completion, is David's immensely accurate and detailed painted illustrations. Examples from Northamptonshire include the Bellerophon mosaic from Croughton in the south of the county.



Harrold Centre, High Street, Harrold, Bedfordshire MK43 7BH


