Mercia and Wessex c.800: Connections and Conflicts, presented by Barbara Yorke, Emeritus Professor in Early Medieval History, University of Winchester.

The annual Brixworth Lecture is always well worth attending for the lecture itself, the chance to spend some time sitting in Brixworth Church and, last but not least, the excellent pre-lecture tea served in the nearby Heritage Centre from 3.30pm.

Celebrating 150 years of Northampton Museums & Art Gallery

The exhibition showcases 150 objects which show the richness and diversity of the collections from 1865 to the present day and look to the future of the museum as it begins its exciting new development.

The exhibition will feature well known objects that have been displayed at

Northampton Museum and Art Gallery and Abington Park Museum over the years, alongside some less well known. Celebrating 150 Years of Northampton Museums & Art Gallery will run until Sunday 15 November. Entry is free.

At the same time, in the ground floor gallery you could visit:

Whose Round is it?

A History of Brewing in Northampton, open until Sunday 31 January 2016, will explore the role of brewing and pubs in Northampton from the

medieval malting kiln recently excavated at Angel Street; through the large scale brewers of the 19th century, when there were 60 pubs brewing their own beer and 15 larger scale breweries just within Northampton, to the modern breweries both large and small.

British Museum Celts: art and identity

Open until 31 January 2016, so make a winter trip to London, after booking online first, of course.

This is the first major exhibition to examine the full history of Celtic art and identity. The story unfolds over 2,500 years, from the first recorded mention of 'Celts' to an exploration of contemporary Celtic influences. Discover how this identity has been revived and reinvented over the centuries, across Britain, Europe and beyond.

From the depths of the River Thames come magnificent Iron Age treasures such as the Waterloo helmet and Battersea shield. Roman jewellery, early medieval manuscripts and crosses, a Liberty tea set and even a modern football shirt tell a constantly evolving British and Irish story. Major loans, such as the spectacular Gundestrup cauldron, reveal profound cultural connections across Europe.
